Vermont's largest energy event offers something for everyone

Montpelier—Energy and affordability are on the minds of many Vermonters this year. Renewable Energy Vermont's 7th Annual Conference and Trade Show, entitled "A Bright Future for Vermont's Renewables," will feature presentations and discussion on how Vermont can create a more sustainable and vibrant economy using renewable energy sources.

The conference features many renewable energy experts from Vermont as well covering topics such as community wind power and financing, electric transportation, energy policy, heating with renewable energy and the role of biofuels in Vermont.

New this year, an opening reception and exhibition offer homeowners and businesses the opportunity to learn about available renewable energy products and services. More than 50 renewable energy companies are expected to show their wares on Tuesday, October 14 from 4 to 7 pm in the Sheraton's Exhibition Hall and all day on October 15 (7:30 am – 4:30 pm). "When we hear about people buying coal to heat their homes this winter, we know there's a real need to get information out about the clean energy products and services that are available to homeowners," says Perchlik.
